

COPYRIGHT AND IMAGES

As a student or employee at Aarhus School of Architecture, your use of images in the context of the school is mostly covered by the school's agreement with [Copydan Billede](#).

This means that you can use other people's images in assignments, final projects, lectures, internal information materials or compendiums. You can use images from the internet, books, magazines etc.

Remember! that even though the school has an agreement with Copydan, you still have to credit the copyright holder of the images you use.

Please keep in mind that the school's agreement with Copydan only applies as long as you are a student or employee here.

This means that if you have produced material (ex. a final project, brochures or compendiums) at the school, where you have used images that are not your own or copyright-cleared, then you can't use these materials for job applications, projects outside the school and so on. Nor can you publish such materials on the internet.

Fortunately there are many e-resources that can help you find high quality, free images (as well as text, code, animations etc.) that are available for everyone's use.

By using images from these sites you can both avoid breaking copyright law and ensure that the material you produce at Aarhus School of Architecture remains usable in the future.

It is very easy to search for images in Flickr or Google, but it can be difficult to decipher whether you are allowed to use the images you find.



If you want to be sure to only find material that is freely available, you can keep an eye out for the widely used Creative Commons symbols.

Creative Commons (CC) is a global nonprofit organization with the purpose of ensuring that creative material is shared in a legal and transparent way. CC provides a [search engine](#), where you can search for material that is shared under a CC Licence.

When you find images through CC the combination of different symbols will tell you, what you can do with the images and on what conditions. The CC symbols are:




Attribution

All CC licenses require that you must give the copyright holder credit the way they request, but not in a way that suggests they endorse you or your use.



ShareAlike

The copyright holder lets you copy, distribute, display and modify their work, as long as you distribute the resulting material on the same terms.



NoDerivs

The copyright holder lets you copy, distribute and display only original copies of their work.



NonCommercial

The copyright holder lets you copy, distribute, display and (unless they have chosen NoDerivs) modify and use their work for any purpose other than commercially.



NoCopyright

The copyright holder has dedicated their work to the public domain, which means you can copy, modify and distribute the work, even for commercial purposes.

Be proactive! and reuse, remix and share images with a Creative Commons license to help strengthen the digital sharing of creative works.
